In Romney Marsh – John Davidson

Unless your school is in East Sussex or southern Kent, it's unlikely that the area will have crossed the consciousness of you or your students. So the first task is to find out where Romney Marsh is and anything else about its situation and history. While they're at it, ask students to find out about the Dymchurch Wall.
